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## State Police helicopter swoops in to surveil Truthers Trooper tells pro-life attorney, You need permit—We are the law

Defend Life's 17th annual summer Face the Truth Tour made stops at 15 locations across West Virginia, Maryland and Washington, D.C., from July 24-28 to show the public the ugly reality of abortion.

The dedicated pro-lifers braved grueling summer heat and nasty name-calling—but also thanks and praise—and some unusual "firsts," both good and not-so-good.

#### 'We are the law'

Defend Life's Truth Tour morning stop in Bowie, Md., on July 26 was winding up when Defend Life Director Jack Ames noticed a helicopter overhead.

"It was flying at a typical altitude, maybe a thousand feet, headed in a southwesterly direction toward Route 50," Ames recalls. I assumed that it was going to an accident scene."

Seconds afterwards, however, a second helicopter, flying at a much lower altitude—Ames estimates about 500 feet—circled above the pro-lifers, then flew back over Route 3.

"It was obvious to me that we were being observed from the air," says Ames.

Ten minutes later, he "called in

the signs." The 20 core team volunteers, who had been stretched out holding signs, many showing aborted babies, for a quarter-mile along Route 3 and Route 450, packed their signs into vans and left for Mass at nearby Sacred Heart Chapel.

"I noticed that Katherine Adelaide, one of our volunteers who is an attorney, was still up at the very beginning of our line-up, talking to a police officer who had just arrived in a cruiser," says Ames.

When she saw three or four police officers standing next to a

police car with flashing overhead lights, Adelaide recalls, "I was concerned about the young volunteers having to deal with police, so I hurried over."

She thanked the officers for being there to protect the pro-lifers and asked if everything was okay.

Trooper First Class Moreno told her that there were many complaints about the signs.

"He said he understood that we had a First Amendment right to free speech, and asked me if we had a permit," she recalls.

"I said we didn't need a permit, that we were covered by the First Amendment, and that whoever said we needed a permit needed to show him the law. He said that his supervisor said we needed a permit.

"He told me, 'We are the law.' I said, 'No you are not the law; you enforce the law.'"

Trooper Moreno told her that they had been told to "break down the line" of protesters, and that some callers said there were "hundreds" of protesters.

Moreno then told another officer to call it in that there was no need to break down the line after observing that the line of protesters was gone.

Ames notes that during Defend Life's 17 years of conducting Face the Truth tours, the Maryland State Police on two occasions arrested pro-lifers who were peacefully protesting.

In 2006, also at the Bowie stop, a state trooper arrested 76-year-old core team volunteer Bob Newman, charging him with refusing to obey a "lawful order" to leave.

When the case went to court, the arresting officer failed to appear and the judge dismissed the charges.

State troopers mass-arrested and jailed 18 pro-lifers, including Ames, at the Bel Air stop in 2008, claiming that they needed a permit to protest.

The Maryland State Police in 2012 agreed to pay \$385,000 to settle a lawsuit brought by nine of the arrested pro-lifers.

The settlement occurred after a U.S. District Court judge ruled a year earlier that the State Police had violated the Defend Lifers' First Amendment free speech rights and their Fourth Amendment rights against unreasonable seizures.

The settlement agreement ordered the State Police to begin a program to train their officials and employees on First and Fourth Amendment rights.

#### **Truthers visit White House**

For the first time in its 17 years of Truth tours, the Truthers made a stop in front of the White House.

Ames couldn't have been happier with the location.

"The entire area on Pennsylvania Avenue between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets is now a mall, so there is a lot of pedestrian traffic—everyone who visits Washington wants to see the White House!" he points out.

"We had many good conversations with people there; it is a great opportunity for pro-life evangelization. I talked to a lot of people from out-of-town and many foreign tourists, many of whom were pro-life."

Ames was interviewed by the White House reporter for EWTN, which aired the interview on the evening of the July 25 stop.

#### How 'bout a black Jesus?

Truthers have generally received a friendly reception in past years at the Reisterstown Road Shopping Plaza, which is in a predominantly African-American neighborhood in Northwest Baltimore.

But racism reared its ugly head at the stop this year.

First-time core team member Jimmy Hayden was holding an American flag and a large poster of Christ when, says Truth Tour veteran Albert Stecklein, "This African-American guy comes up and says, 'That Jesus is too white—how 'bout a black Jesus?' Then he adds, 'We're going to f--- you up unless you leave; it's your decision."

One of two other black men accompanying the speaker told Jimmy, "Hey, you gotta understand,

this is our space! Maybe it's better you're not here," recalls Stecklein.

Hayden retreated to where Ames was standing about a hundred feet away and told the director what had happened.

The three men followed Hayden.

"This guy grabbed my third trimester sign," says Ames. "He threw it down in the street and kicked it a couple of times."

Ames called 911 and two officers arrived 20 minutes later.

Ames identified the perpetrator, who remained in the area, and the police wrote reports on the "assault by threat" against Hayden and larceny against Ames for theft of the sign.

"They did not arrest the guy," says Ames. "He was so brazen, he went over afterwards and took photos of me!"

#### **Truthers win in Westminster**

The town of Westminster has

customarily yanked in the red carpet for the Truth Tour each year.

But this year, Defend Life made a last-minute end run around them and won.

As usual, the city put huge, lighted standing message board construction signs at either end of the demonstration, reading "Warning: Graphic Photo Demonstration Ahead."

And as usual, says Ames, "The police told us, you can do this demonstration, but you can't stand in front of this bicycle shop on Route 27.

"The owner, who must be proabortion, said that we were standing on private property. The police sent us a letter to that effect about six weeks before this year's tour."

The "bicycle shop" in question is about 150 feet long, says Ames, lengthy enough for three sign holders to stand in the line of protest.

"We need to maintain a continuity of signs for our message to be most effective," he explains.

For the last few years, Defend Life had complied with the order.

But this year they checked the plats and confirmed that the property in dispute was public right-of-way.

Two hours before the start of the Westminster stop, attorney Martin Cannon of the Thomas More Society called police with this information.

"They backed down" and rescinded their order, says Ames.

Still, the police came out in full force for the peaceful Westminster stop, he notes.

"They must have had every police officer on duty there, on high alert. They were riding three-wheel stand-up motor scooters.

"What a waste of taxpayers' money!"

#### **Pro-Abortion 'Handmaid'**

The core team was loading their signs into the vans after the morning stop on Charles Street in Towson July 27 when a woman dressed in a floor-length scarlet gown and a

#### D.C.'s Northwest Center does double duty

The frontline in the battle to save children from abortion runs through the Adams Morgan neighborhood of Northwest Washington, D.C.

While that district bustles with trendy restaurants, noisy bars and quaint shops, the Northwest Center at 2702 Ontario Road blends into a block of row homes on a tree-lined side street just a few strides off the main drag.

The quiet location befits a ministry that lives out the gospel with humility. But the Northwest Center (NWC) also has great impact on its community.

In 2016, NWC received more than 1,600 visits from clients, most of whom reside in Washington, D.C., but also a few from Maryland and Virginia.

An article about Forestville Pregnancy Center in the May-June 2017 *Defend Life* noted that NWC is one of the resources to which FPC refers some of its homeless clients: The Northwest Center is not just a crisis pregnancy center but also a maternity home.

NWC's pregnancy center sits below ground—the lowest level of a four-story row house built with large blocks the color of wet sand.

The maternity home, encompassing the three upper floors, must be accessed by a separate outside entrance, right next door to the embassy of the Central African Republic.

The subterranean pregnancy center is a narrow suite. At the front, clients sit in a small waiting room with large, Persian-orange tinted floor tiles under a low ceiling. Six vinyl chairs, a changing table, and a receptionist's desk round out the room.

Flyers announcing job opportunities and posters promoting the beauty of life paper the walls. Two counseling rooms lie to the right as you enter, and an office and storage room fall farther back in the suite.

The maternity home is a grander affair, a spacious residence provided without charge (as are all NWC's services and gifts) to homeless women

who are pregnant or whose born children are less than three months old.

Wooden floor planks creak like church pews, a sound as comforting as an old, familiar hymn. The high ceilings, twisting staircase, and roomy chambers provide a touch of extravagance that most of NWC's clients likely have never experienced. Two long sofas settle at a right angle in the cavernous living room. A kitchen, laundry room, and office take up the far end of the first floor.

The maternity home's second and third floors contain six bed-

rooms and two bathrooms, but at any given moment, not all bedrooms are in use. At least one is kept open and on reserve for an emergency housing need.

A resident-manager lives on-site with the women, who are expected to do chores, respect the center's curfew, and meet with NWC Executive Director Susan Gallucci to discuss their personal, familial, and employment goals. From day one of their stay, clients work with NWC staff and volunteers to prepare for their transition out of the maternity home. While living at NWC, the women tend to form a tight-knit community and often babysit for each other, says Gallucci.

NWC policy permits women to stay at most 18 months, but some leave sooner if they find another transitional housing program, subsidized housing of their own, or arrangements with family members. An extension beyond a year-and-a-half can be granted in exceptional circumstances.

Homelessness is on the rise in Washington, says Gallucci, driven in part by the District's gentrification program now two years underway. Individuals who are unemployed or earning wages at the poverty level face a dwindling number of affordable housing options.

In the past, many homeless women in crisis pregnancy survived by couch surfing—moving from one friend's or family member's sofa to the next. Recently, an increasing number of people, including women carrying their preborn children, are sleeping on park benches, in laundromats, or are riding Metro buses all night long.

The need for safe shelter for

#### as pregnancy center and maternity home

pregnant women in Washington is at an all-time high.

Still, not every client who stays at NWC does so because of a financial crisis. Washington boasts an internationally diverse population, but many come from traditions that shame women facing unplanned pregnancies. Over the years, NWC has served a number of young, unmarried pregnant girls evicted by their families. This is what happened to Sarah (not her real name) less than two years ago.

Sarah came from a middle-class, Muslim family. At 19 and in college, Sarah was able to hide her pregnancy from her family until her father intercepted a medical document sent to her house.

He kicked Sarah (and his preborn grandchild) out. She slept in a laundry room of another building and began to consider abortion. At more than four months pregnant, Sarah found NWC, where she was immediately and warmly welcomed.

Every day, NWC staff and volunteers live out the gospel of Jesus Christ, offering shelter, hope, and protection for outcasts, even those (particularly those, one might say) from backgrounds intolerant of Christianity.

Sarah gave birth to a boy in July 2016, and the two occasionally stop by NWC to visit.

Protecting children and serving women in need has long been Gallucci's passion. While an undergraduate at Georgetown University,

she volunteered at NWC when it was located in DuPont Circle. She earned a masters of social work degree (MSW) from Catholic University in 2000, and then worked for six years with Child Protection Services in Montgomery County, Md. For the last 11 years, she has been NWC's executive director.

The Georgetown connection

runs strong in NWC's history. The pregnancy center, originally located at St. Stephen Martyr Catholic Church on Pennsylvania Avenue, about nine blocks northwest of the White House, was founded in 1981 by Hoya alumni and students. NWC has run a maternity home since 1993, and has been located on Ontario Road since 1997.

Natalie Jones, who oversees NWC's pregnancy center operations, also started at NWC as a volunteer while an undergraduate at Georgetown.

In 2015 she earned a MSW from Catholic University, and soon after joined NWC full time.

That both Gallucci and Jones are licensed social workers means they bring a high level of professionalism to interactions with clients facing mental health and substance abuse issues. They are also trained to make domestic violence assessments and educate women about fetal alcohol syndrome and the dangers of smoking while pregnant.

"We provide a safe space for women to slow down," says Jones, adding that NWC also provides



many basic but important services: pregnancy testing, prenatal care, parenting classes, resume writing, interview prep and professional attire for interviews, information about food stamps and health insurance, and English as a Second Language classes.

Jones speaks Spanish fluently, and one NWC volunteer speaks Amharic, the language of many area residents who hail from Ethiopia and Eritrea.

Despite the myriad services, Gallucci counts one item as topping the Northwest Center's wish list: a sonogram machine. Research published by the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates indicates that 78 percent of abortionvulnerable women change their minds about having an abortion

after viewing a sonogram image of their preborn baby.

NWC has several other needs as

well. Financial donations are welcome, as are gently used clothes for babies, young children and mothers. (The D.C. Diaper Bank provides NWC's nappie needs.)

The center is also seeking to hire a development director and is looking to bring on more volunteers.

The center's main annual fundraiser is its black-tie Indian Summer Ball dinner and dance, to be held this year on October 21. For more information about supporting NWC, see *northwestcenter.net*.

white, Puritan-style cap suddenly appeared in their presence.

"She walked all around our cars, with her head bowed and her hands folded, as though in prayer," recalls Stecklein.

"She didn't say anything. If we asked her, 'Can we help you?' or what she wanted, she wouldn't answer."

Her outfit and behavior was clearly referencing a 2017 TV series called "The Handmaid," based on the book, *The Handmaid's Tale*, by Margaret Atwood.

The 1985 dystopian novel is set in a near-future New England, in a totalitarian, Christian society named Gilead that has overthrown the U.S. government and brutally subjugates women.

At the Northern Parkway stop in Baltimore that evening, the woman in red appeared once again.

"She was doing the same thing, but this time she sometimes walked in the street against traffic—and a guy was following her with a camera," says Stecklein.

"Finally, she broke her silence. She was telling people to support Planned Parenthood, and support women's health.

"She said, 'These people are against Planned Parenthood!"

The woman later went with the cameraman to a car and they drove off

Planned Parenthood staged a protest of the proposed Senate healthcare bill on June 27 outside the Capitol building in Washington, with two dozen women dressed as "Handmaid's Tale" characters.

#### 'Go where you're not wanted'

The Truthers had suffered a major disappointment when they learned that Fr. Denis Wilde of Priests for Life, a beloved Truth Tour

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#### Pro-lifer beats the odds, wins W.Va. state senate seat

Patricia Rucker has been a regular participant for years at Defend Life's Face the Truth Tour stop in Charles Town, West Virginia.

"I started going in about 2006," says Rucker; "I have tried to go every year."

Pro-life activities have been an important part of the busy life of the homeschooling mom of five kids, even when she decided to run for political office—and the pace has picked up exponentially since she was elected to the West Virginia State Senate last November.

Born Patricia Elena Puertas in Caracas, Venezuela, Rucker moved with her parents to Montgomery County, Md., in 1981, when her father, José Puertas, an international correspondent, was assigned by Agence France Presse to the Washington, DC desk.

"I've been interested in politics since I was 16," Rucker recalls. "I was passionate about government! That's why I majored in history in college."

After graduation from Trinity College, she taught social studies in Montgomery County public schools before she and husband Jimmy began their family.

After an eight-year process, Patricia was granted American citizenship in 1984.

"As soon as I could vote, I went into the voting booth," says Rucker.

"I was dismayed that I didn't know a lot of the candidates running for local offices, so I didn't know how to vote for those offices. I pledged to myself that I would get to know the local candidates and representatives."

Rucker started attending local political meetings and became active

in the local Tea Party.

"When I found out that someone was representing me and I didn't like them, I would try to get someone to run against them," she says.

One such person in the 2014 election was the incumbent delegate for District 67, her own district—Demo-

crat Stephen Skinner, the first openly gay lawmaker in West Virginia.

"He was a rich, well-funded lawyer—completely anti-life," says Rucker. "I couldn't stand the thought of the Democrat going unchallenged. I tried hard, but I couldn't get anyone to run against him."

So she threw her hat in the ring as the Republican candidate and waged a grass-roots campaign, doggedly going door-to-door to ask for votes.

"I lost by only 133 votes," she recalls; "it was a shock to the establishment!

"That winter, when I lost, God spoke to me: He told me He wanted me to run for state senate."

The person who held the senate

seat in District 16 had held it for 16 years.

"He was an unbeatable Democrat. All the Republicans said nobody could beat him. But I put my name in, and this time, I started my campaign early."

Six months later, the incumbent state senator decided not to run.

Her old nemesis, Delegate Skinner, entered the race for the senate seat.

"It was me and him again," says Rucker.

"Skinner had a lot more money and connections: he had been born and raised in the area," she points out.

His campaign outspent hers 4 to 1.

"He put radio ads in DC, Hagerstown and Frederick to reach the commuters. This is a very expensive market!

"It was ugly," she adds. "He attacked me and he lied; he said I wanted to legalize all drugs."

In the meantime, Rucker was conducting an intensive, low-budget campaign.

"From Monday through Saturday, for one and a half years, I went door-to-door for two to four hours a day. I knocked on over 15,000 doors. I also went to events and picnics."

When the votes were counted, Rucker had won by 5,000 votes.

West Virginia's 2017 legislative session began on February 8.

"It was quite a learning experience!" says Rucker. "I had no idea it was so much work."

The Harpers Ferry resident had to move to the state capital of Charleston for the session.

"Being away from my family was hard," she remembers. "I'm very grateful to have a husband who

could take over the home operations when I was gone."

Rucker and her fellow-Republican senators, who only recently have held a very narrow majority in the Senate, faced some pro-life battles in the 2017 session.

"West Virginia is generally prolife," she explains, "so the candidates have to *say* they're pro-life. But the Democrats didn't *do* anything pro-life when they were elected to office."

Republicans had been pushing pro-life legislation for the last three years.

"We already had a law requiring parental notification. But the law said they could get a waiver from *any* physician; it didn't even have to be their own doctor.

"I wanted to close that loophole."

Some young adults did some undercover investigating, going to local abortion clinics and posing as teens who wanted an abortion.

"They were told, 'You can go to

a certain doctor and he'll give you a waiver.

"I introduced a bill in the Senate, and another pro-lifer introduced a similar bill in the House, that amended the law so you would have to go to a judge to get a waiver. This was the only way to ensure help for a child who could not go to her parents for good reasons."

The judge, who has access to re-

sources such as child protective services, could make sure she got the help she needed, explains Rucker.

"The bill passed, but with a fight from the Democrats!" she says.

What advice would Rucker give a pro-lifer who was considering run-

ning for local elected office?

"I would not do it without lots of prayer," she advises.

A devout Catholic, Rucker prayed before the Eucharist in Eucharistic Adoration.

If you do decide to run, she warns, "It is going to be difficult and ugly. You will be attacked and lied about."

Rucker went to a campaign training program in her county, talked to other candidates, and asked them for advice.

"You also have to have a strong support team. I had a volunteer whose job was to tell me events coming up that I should go to. Another volunteer helped me to write things; I was always so exhausted after campaigning, I was too tired to write.

"It was a team effort; I couldn't have done it without them."

But she urges pro-lifers to run for office if they can.

"We need pro-lifers to run and win!" says Rucker.





mainstay for years who was scheduled to offer Mass for the core team on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, had broken his back and collarbone in a fall and couldn't come.

"We had a tough time getting priests for Mass; we had to scramble," remembers Truth Tour Director Julie Smith.

Opposition came in many shapes and sizes during the Tour.

"In Westminster, a young lady with a baby on her hip hand-drew a sign that said, 'Jesus equals love, not shame or shock value," says Smith.

"She stood in the middle of our line with her baby, saying how we made her sick to her stomach, because she had had a miscarriage."

At the final stop on Baltimore National Pike in Catonsville, says the core team's Celia Roberts, "Some women yelled at us, 'Don't take away our choice!"

"Our tour is a good test of the strength of our faith, as you face off against the anger and hatred thrown against you," says Truther Joey

Hayden—"and it makes you stronger in the end."

In contrast, many drivers gave the pro-lifers words of encouragement and signs of support.

At the Bowie stop, at the intersection of Route 3 South and Route 450 West, "dozens of trucks passing by were giving us 'honks' in agreement with our message," says Ames.

One driver stopped and told the core team's Nick Schnitker, "Thanks to you, I decided I won't be aborting my second child."

Another driver confided happily to Truther Mark Charmandy, "When my wife was pregnant, I wouldn't give her the money for an abortion, and she didn't have it. Now my son is 11 years old!"

And at the White Marsh stop, says Stecklein, a woman rolled down her window to tell the pro-lifers, "My first granddaughter is due in 18 weeks—I'm so excited about it!"

Delaware Right to Life President Moira Sheridan, the luncheon speaker on the final day of the Tour, offered some pithy words of advice for the Truthers: "Go where you're not wanted, and keep coming back; if you're catching flak, you know you're hitting the target.

"You have God on your side," she reminded them. "You have the Catholic faith, you have the truth; you have the thirst and the zeal for justice.

"You have to be on the front line!"
"We know we made an impact,"
reflects Ames.

"I couldn't be more pleased."



#### Jack & Patti Enoch - Pro-Life Trailblazers

They typically spoke to 1,500-2,000 eighth grade students a year in the Archdiocese of Baltimore focusing on the development

of the **pre-born** baby and describing in words the horrors of abortion. They used the fetal models that have become so popular over the years. Jack was an attorney. Patti was, and still is, a lover of dance and still teaches ballet after two hip and two knee replacements. She began dancing at age 3 and teaching dance at age 12. Together, they were the proud parents of 9 children and grandparents of 20. Jack went to his eternal reward in October 2015.

Even though Jack Enoch was on the Archdiocese of Baltimore Respect Life Committee, it wasn't easy to gain access to our parochial schools. Often, the pastor had to intervene with

the school principal.

- Frequent afternoon rounds of golf while attending University of Tennessee Law School in Knoxville. Very few law students are smart enough to play golf while attending law school.



#### Physician-assisted suicide on rise, warns MDRTL speaker

"The purpose of society is becoming the elimination of suffering. And this is shifting to eliminating the sufferer."

So said keynote speaker Wesley J. Smith at Maryland Right to Life's seventh annual banquet and silent auction on June 22 at Martin's West, just off the Baltimore Beltway in Woodlawn.

The author of *The War on Humans* focused his talk on developments in physician-assisted suicide (PAS), for decades a fixture in some European countries and in recent years a movement gaining traction in the United States.

PAS proponents, who already have legislative victories in five states (California, Colorado, Oregon, Vermont, and Washington) and in the District of Columbia, have set their sights on Maryland.

A coalition consisting of MDRTL, the Catholic Conference, and various disability rights groups have, for three years in a row, successfully opposed PAS legislation. Each year the bill's sponsors withdrew the bill rather taking a (greater) PR hit from what would likely be a vote by the committee to kill it.

Europe and Canada tell a different story, however. Smith cited a study published in *The Lancet* that found that 8% of all infants who die in the Netherlands are killed by their doctors. Many of these babies don't have terminal illnesses, Smith reported, but are euthanized because of their disabilities.

In professional journals, Dutch psychiatrists are encouraged to increase their assisted suicide work. Smith lambasted medical personnel who are supposed to be a despondent person's last guardian, not their executioner.

In Belgium, many mentally ill, even those without other physical maladies, are euthanized, and their organs are harvested. Smith also said that it's becoming increasingly popular for elderly Belgian couples

to procure assisted suicides together.

Switzerland has a booming assisted suicide business: "clients" fly in from other countries to Swiss "clinics" to end their lives.

In Canada, qualified assisted suicide physicians who won't carry out the procedure are required to refer the patient to another physician who will.

Looking at the progress PAS pushers have made, Smith asked, "Why now?" A century ago, many ill people died in agony, but today the medical community has the ability to treat pain effectively. But in a culture of death, eliminating suf-

fering is increasingly carried out by eliminating the sufferer.

Before Smith spoke, the banquet attendees, more than 200 in number, heard reports from MDRTL's new lobbyist, Therese Hessler, as well as Congressman Dr. Andy Harris.

Hessler reported that during its 2017 session, the Maryland legislature once again showed no mercy toward preborn children. Neither of two MDRTL-supported bills, the Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act and the Unborn Child Protection from Dismemberment Abortion Act, made it out of committee.

But MDRTL will work with pro-life legislators to bring these bills forward in the next session, she said.

Harris, Maryland's only prolife Congressman, praised President Donald Trump's pro-life agenda, saying that Trump has already surpassed what former president Ronald Reagan did for the pro-life movement. Reagan's Mexico City policy forbade American taxpayer funding of international family planning programs that promoted or carried out abortions, but. Trump cut off all funding to such *organizations* (not just their programs).

Defunding Planned Parenthood in the United States, also on the President's agenda, has hit some snags in the form of two Republican women senators—Susan Collins of Maine and Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, Harris noted. (At the time of the writing of this article, defunding the nation's leading abortion business had not come to a vote.)

Harris rebuffed criticism that defunding Planned Parenthood

#### Terry hopes docu sets the record straight on McCorvey

When Norma McCorvey died on February 18, the *Washington Post* concluded its obituary on her with a quote that made Randall Terry furious.

"I don't require much in my life," the *Post* quoted McCorvey as saying; ". . . I just never had the privilege to go to an abortion clinic, lay down and have an abortion. That's the only thing I never had."

The problem with the quote, Terry points out, is that Norma said it in 1994. A year later, she converted to Christianity and became active in the fight against abortion, a stance she maintained for the rest of her life.

"That's deliberate deceit!" says Terry, and typical of the *Post* and "other rags" in their coverage of McCorvey since her conversion.

Most pro-lifers know that Norma McCorvey was the "Jane Roe" of *Roe v. Wade*, the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision that struck down the abortion laws in all 50 states.

After McCorvey became a prolife Christian, the mainstream media predictably gave her negative coverage.

Joshua Prager's lengthy 2013 *Vanity Fair* article, "The Accidental Activist," was typical; "He labeled her as a phony," says Terry.

"Prager is working on a book

on Norma's life. He will likely cast her in an unfavorable light." Other liberal media will doubtless follow suit, Terry believes.

That's why he decided to produce a documentary on Norma's life: to set the record straight. "I felt like I owed it to her as a friend," he adds.

"Finding Norma McCorvey: The Jane Roe of *Roe vs. Wade*," is 98 percent complete, says Terry.

The film mixes numerous film clips, interviews and photos of Mc-Corvey, both before and after her conversion, with contemporary interviews with a dozen of her pro-life friends.

In the 80-minute documentary, which Terry narrates, he compares her Christian conversion to that of John Newton, the notorious British slave-trader who, after his conversion, wrote the beloved hymn, "Amazing Grace."

"Finding Norma" highlights what could actually be called the "low lights" of Norma's life, says Terry.

"Most people aren't aware of the horrific life she led as a child and prior to her conversion," he points out. "That's why her conversion is all the more startling.

The film also highlights "how God orchestrated events to bring about her conversion," he notes.

"Finding Norma" recounts Norma's tragic childhood, which was marred by physical and verbal abuse. Her mother beat her unmercifully. Her father's mother was a prostitute, whom Norma often visited at a house of prostitution.

She was sent to a reform school for girls at the age of 11.

Her mother left her for several

weeks with a male relative who raped her repeatedly.

At age 16, Norma married Woody McCorvey. While pregnant with her first child, she frequented a lesbian bar.

Her life was filled with drug and alcohol abuse, drug dealing, and promiscuity with both men and women.

Terry first met Norma when the two were on opposing sides, Terry as founder and director of Operation Rescue, which blocked the doors of abortion clinics in the 1980s, and McCorvey as a pro-abortion demonstrator who harassed him by blowing a whistle in his ear at a protest.

After Operation Rescue opened its national headquarters next to A Choice for Women abortion clinic in Texas, where McCorvey was working in 1994, OR's new director, Evangelical minister Philip "Flip" Benham, befriended McCorvey and persuaded her to attend his church.

On August 8, 1995, Benham baptized McCorvey in a backyard swimming pool in Dallas.

"God used Operation Rescue, its leaders and its foot soldiers to bring Norma to Jesus Christ," says Terry.

"After her conversion, we became friends. Norma worked with the Rescue movement and every prolifer she could.

"She was committed to overturning *Roe v. Wade.* The pro-choicers were rattled!"

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In "Finding Norma," pro-life activists and friends of McCorvey describe her as impulsive, warmhearted, unpredictable—and haunted by her role in *Roe v. Wade*.

"She was a typical Texas woman," quips Mark Crutcher, president of Texas-based Life Dynamics: "She'd be the most gracious, affable, nicest woman you could meet—but you couldn't cross that line."

"She enjoyed the limelight!" says Rev. Rob Schenck, an Evangelical minister. "She was raw, unpretentious in her humanity. She always let you know what she thought!"

"I got to know her over the years," says Fr. Frank Pavone, national director of Priests for Life. "She had a good sense of humor; we always ended up with a laugh."

"She asked me a lot of questions about Catholicism," remembers Janet Morana, Priests for Life's executive director.

On August 17, 1998, at St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Dallas, Norma was received into the Catholic Church.

But the thought of the babies being murdered because of *Roe v. Wade* tormented her, says Terry.

"She told me, 'I know God has forgiven me, but I can't forgive myself," says Crutcher.

A heavy drinker and lifelong smoker, McCorvey suffered from chronic bronchitis.

When she died at age 69 of heart failure at an assisted living facility in Katy, Texas, her pro-life friends were at her bedside, praying the rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet.

"She reached up her hands as if she were embracing someone," recalls pro-lifer Karen Garnett. "She went from 'Where are the babies?' to 'Look at all the babies! Look at these two babies right in front of us!'

"She was at peace," she concludes.

Terry hopes that the documentary "will set the record straight about Norma."

His organization, the Society for Truth and Justice, hopes to distribute "Finding Norma" through Christian networks first.

"Then we will ultimately make it free to everyone online," says Terry.

#### **Book Review**

#### Godless concepts of humans have wrought deadly consequences

At the Bel Air stop of Defend Life's 2004 summer Face the Truth Tour, several pro-abortion teens came up and challenged some of the pro-lifers.

All animal life is of equal value, the teens declared; a chicken or even a snake is as valuable as a human being.

"You pro-lifers eat meat," one girl pointed out: "You kill animals, which are just as valuable as humans. So you have no right to tell anyone they can't choose to have an abortion!"

The pro-lifers were nonplussed. How could these kids think a chicken is just as valuable as a baby?

"What if you were driving on a bridge and ahead there was a chicken and a little baby crawling on the roadway," one pro-lifer shot back.

"You couldn't veer around and you were going too fast to stop in time. Wouldn't you choose to hit the chicken rather than the baby?"


"It wouldn't matter which one you hit," the girl insisted. The other teens nodded solemnly in agreement.

The Face the Truthers couldn't believe their ears—where in the world had these kids gotten these crazy ideas?

Richard Weikart gives us the answer in *The Death of Humanity - and the case for life*.

Weikart, a professor of modern European history at California State University and Senior Fellow at the Discovery Institute's Center for Science and Culture, traces the historical roots of the premise that humans are just one species among animals and no more important or valuable than any other species.

"Since the time of the Enlightenment in the eighteenth century and especially in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries—many Western intellectuals have dispensed with the view that humans are created in the image and likeness of God and thus



have immeasurable value and inalienable rights," he declares.

Most mainstream Enlightenment thinkers agreed with Thomas Jefferson's position in the Declaration of Independence because they still believed in a God who had created humans and immutable moral laws.

But a minority, the Radical Englightenment thinkers, embraced philosophical materialism, an atheistic view that nothing exists except matter and energy.

The Radical Enlightenment would spawn secular philosophies that grew stronger over the next couple of centuries, says Weikart.

Greatly aiding and abetting these philosophies was Darwin's theory of evolution, which convinced people that the distance between humans and other animals was not all that great.

"Christianity teaches that humans are intrinsically valuable because they are created in the image and likeness of God. Their lives have purpose and meaning. They have attributes that set them apart from other animals, such as rationality, linguistic ability, creativity, free will, aesthetic sense, and religious yearnings," says Weikart.

But, armed with the twin weapons of Radical Enlightenment and Darwinian theory, the intelligentsia have attacked Christianity with fervor, achieving impressive—and appalling—results.

Hitler based the murder of two hundred thousand disabled and the killing of millions of Jews on Friedrich Nietzsche's view that Darwin's theory of evolution proved some humans are more valuable than others and justified the killing of inferior humans by superior humans.

Weikart links the depradations of the Marxist governments of Stalin, Chairman Mao and Pol Pot to Marx's philosophy, grounded in economic determinism, that human nature was not determined by God but shaped by economic conditions, and that communism could alter human nature.

Marx condoned force and violence to reshape humanity. Stalin's forced collectivization program, his purges and the Soviet Gulags; Mao's executions, labor camps and massive famine resulting from his Great Leap Forward; Pol Pot's Khmer Rouge genocidal regime in which one out of seven Cambodians perished—between these and other communist regimes, the total number of people slain in the name of communism approaches 100 million.

The increasing secularization of European and American intellectual life has permeated almost every aspect of our lives, says Weikart.

With God out of the picture, men are free to promote a moral philosophy based on pleasure.

"The single-minded pursuit of pleasure and sexual profligacy are becoming mainstream in American culture," he observes.

"Not only are Hollywood, the media, and the internet saturating American culture with a pleasure-seeking, sex-saturated mentality, but universities are purveying the same values."

Weikart covers a multitude of philosophers, scientists and others who have influenced society's concept of humanity for the worse.

Among them is John B. Watson, a psychology professor at Johns Hopkins University in the early 1900s. Watson founded behaviorism, a form of environmental determinism that rejects body-soul dualism and focuses solely on what

behavior a psychologist can observe.

According to Watson, all human behavior is caused by some stimulus from the environment that evokes a completely determined response; thus, a person is nothing but a stimulus-response machine. Any flaws in a person's behavior are entirely the fault of his or her parents and teachers, he maintained.

Watson was sure that, given the power, he could transform human-

ity. Child-rearing should not be left up to parents, he insisted, but "worked out by patient laboratory methods."

Ideally, children should be raised as much as possible under laboratory control; mothers would not know the identity of their children, who would be rotated among families until the age of 20.

Despite some of his bizarre ideas, Watson won many disciples, and behaviorism dominated American psychology through the midtwentieth century.

Once loosed from the fetters of the Judean-Christian sanctity-oflife ethic, intellectual elites were free to support the "right to suicide," euthanasia (voluntary and involuntary), abortion, and even infanticide

Many of us are familiar with Peter Singer, who holds an endowed chair in bioethics at Princeton University, and his view that parents should be allowed to kill a defective infant.

Most people are horrified by his assertion; yet, it is only a logical extension of the determinist view that justifies abortion, euthanasia and suicide.

Weikart details the faulty reasoning and logical fallacies of the intellectuals who assure us that humanity is just a cosmic accident.

Despite their declarations to the contrary, however, "most people understand at some level that human life has meaning, that it is not devoid of purpose," he believes.

"I consider Christianity the proper antidote for the death of humanity," concludes Weikart; "Jesus told His disciples, 'I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly."

#### Do not ask for whom the bell tolls: it tolls for Charlie Gard—and us

On July 24 Chris Gard and Connie Yates, the parents of Baby Charlie Gard, ended their legal battle to bring their baby to the United States for experimental treatment.

Mr. Gard rightly excoriated the legal system for mandating that Charlie go for months without treatment, thus greatly reducing his chances for survival.

On July 28, Baby Charlie died. Many are aware of the tragic plight of Charlie Gard. For those who aren't, here is a brief synopsis.

Charlie was an 11-month-old infant in England with a rare condition called mitochondrial DNA depletion syndrome.

He was on a ventilator at Great Ormond Street Hospital. The hospital wanted to remove him from the ventilator, in complete disregard of his parents' wishes and rights.

His parents, through the generosity of others throughout the world, raised over \$1.7 million (U.S. dollars) to bring him to the U.S. for treatment. Both the British and European Union courts ruled that Charlie's parents had no right to take him from the hospital and that the hospital could take him off the ventilator.

This case garnered international attention. As a result, British authorities had "cause for pause." After a hearing (from which hospital attorneys attempted to bar Charlie's parents) the courts decided to let an American doctor (who has some expertise with this syndrome) examine Charlie.

Charlie's condition was deter-

mined to be too far deteriorated for the experimental treatment to be effective.

Earlier in July, President Trump offered assistance to the Gard family. In contrast, the response from several Catholic organizations has been nothing short of abysmal.

The so-called "Pontifical Academy for Life" (that recently saw all its faithful members summarily dismissed) issued on June 28 a statement that gave the green light to the murderous British and EU courts while offering crocodile tears to the parents.

It's worth pointing out that in the course of so doing, it misquoted *Evangelium Vitae*. The PAF said, "We must also accept the limits of medicine and, as stated in paragraph 65 of the encyclical *Evangelium Vi*-

tae, avoid aggressive medical procedures that are disproportionate to any expected results or excessively burdensome to the patient or the family."

In reality, EV stated that the family *may* forego such treatments, not *must* avoid. Moreover, the context of EV makes plain that the decision lies with the patient or his/her family, not medical professionals.

After this PAF statement sparked much outrage, the Gesu Bambino Hospital, owned by the Vatican, offered to care for Charlie.

At the same time, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops spearheaded a meeting of Catholic leaders in Florida called the Convocation of Catholic Leaders. These "leaders" displayed not one scintilla of real Catholic leadership,

would decrease access for women to non-abortion services: The federal dollars would be redirected to community health centers that don't kill babies.

Harris applauded the election of Karen Handel, who won the race for Georgia's sixth Congressional district despite heavy funding of her opponent: Planned Parenthood alone contributed \$735,000 to Handel's Democratic challenger.

In 2012 Handel left her senior vice president position with Susan G. Komen for the Cure when the organization decided to restore its funding of Planned Parenthood.

Handel later wrote *Planned Bullyhood*, an insider's tale of Planned Parenthood's "ugly, modern-day shakedown" (in the words of a September 18, 2012, review of Handel's book by *The Washington Times*) of the cancer-fighting charity.

"We need pro-life women in Congress—bottom line," said Harris.

Linda Bocklage was handing out flyers at Defend Life's monthly protest at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center on June 21 when a young man walked up and asked, "Who's in charge here?"

Linda pointed to Jack Ames, who was standing in the median strip of Bayview Boulevard next to a sign proclaiming, "Johns Hopkins Kills Babies: Abortions Up To 20 Weeks."

Justice Shakur, a teacher at Harbor High School in South Baltimore, went over to Ames. "I'd like to ask you some questions. Why are you here?"

"Because human life is precious! We have to protect human life, wherever it is," Ames replied. "What's the difference between a radical terrorist mowing down people with a truck *after* they're born and killing them in the womb *before* they're born?"

Shakur peppered Ames with earnest follow-up questions, which the Defend Life director answered patiently, and a long, courteous exchange ensued.

Steve Potorti and Jim Bocklage, holding a protest banner near the sidewalk, got mixed reactions from motorists.

"One woman waved and shouted, 'God bless you!' said Potorti. "Another lady shouted, 'Shut up!' We weren't even saying anything! People don't respect your right to protest anymore," he lamented.




